PROGRAM



Actívítíes Program

The Activities Program provided many different activities that included exercise, language, games, meals, support groups, crafts, senior concerns, literary, social, and health related issues. There are approximately 184 different people who come to the Senior Center during a week. The 3rd Annual Conference on Aging was held at Antioch University Midwest in October. Over 100 people participated.



Transportation Program

The Transportation Program receives funding support from Green County Council on Aging. There were 2,223 passenger rides provided by over 30 volunteers who drove, collectively, over 16,500 miles. Of the rides provided, 40% were for medical appointments. 63% of rides were within Yellow Springs/Miami Township.

Homemaker Program

The Homemaker Program receives funding support from Greene County Council on Aging's Partners in Care (PIC) program. Funding also comes from clients who are private pay. In 2018 the program served, on average, 56 clients per month. There were approximately 4,600 hours of homemaker services rendered.

Dementia Friendly Yellow Springs

In 2018, Yellow Springs received designation as a Dementia Friendly American Community. Yellow Springs is the 2nd community in Ohio to receive the designation. A community book read and a community movie were held in 2018, as well as many other educational events for the community. A support group for caregivers to people with dementia was started and is being maintained twice a month.



The Support Services Program receives funding support from Greene County Council on Aging. The average number of clients seen per month is 12-15. There are approximately 10-12 telephone calls either received or made each day. During Medicare Open Enrollment there were 54 clients who received a review of their Medicare Plans. We were able to save them over \$43,000 in costs.



Míller Fellowship Program

The Senior Center had the services of Tabitha Drover, a Student Miller Fellow in 2018. The Miller Fellowship Program is an initiative of the YS Community Foundation. The Senior Center is very grateful for the work completed by the Student Miller Fellow and to the YS Community Foundation for the funding.



MEMBERSHIP

The main objective of the committee is to increase membership and welcome new members, encourage participation in activities and opportunities to volunteer. Welcoming letters and phone calls are made to each new member. Members are recognized as those who have paid yearly membership dues. It is noted as of December 31, 2018 the Center's database showed 584 members.
